Set in the textured tapestry of the South Side of Chicago, Jeffrey Manor is a testament to the strength and resilience of Black womanhood. The intricate dynamics of generations of Black women bound together by lineage, secrets and tragic outcomes. This play explores generational dysfunction and mental health issues that arise from a lifetime of trauma. Post the Civil Rights Movement Black women have continued tirelessly on a "come up" motif. Some have progressed economically, socially, some have not. Some are mired in addiction, abusive relationships etc. but all are navigating their own challenges. By the time the Black Lives Matter movement has entered the equation the characters experience a directly personal incident with police brutality and systemic racism. This tragic event causes them to no longer suppress their deep-seated emotions. Personal aspirations, societal expectations, familial duty, vulnerabilities, complexities and generational divide all feed the narrative of Jeffrey Manor. The play is a searing exploration of Black womanhood and the lengths a family will go to preserve their legacy and love for one another.
